What is the Buddy Handbook?

At Aid Ukraine Denmark, we are committed to upholding the principles of volunteering and volunteer management. Our Buddy program involves connecting Ukrainians with local volunteers, who are supervised and supported by the Buddy Team.

To ensure the best possible experience for both our volunteers and Ukrainian friends, we provide this "handbook" that covers a range of topics, such as the types of activities that can be done together, how to manage and adapt expectations, language practice tools, and approaches that encourage equal and respectful relationships.

Since Aid Ukraine Denmark is a young NGO, we are continuously developing and testing practical methods to support Ukrainian integration, which are gathered in this "handbook". This includes information materials for Ukrainians, volunteers, and handbooks on how to cooperate with local authorities. Our goal is to provide the resources and support needed to foster meaningful and successful connections between Ukrainians and local volunteers.

The Ukrainians arriving in Denmark are individuals and families who have had to leave behind their homes and loved ones in Ukraine due to Russia's ongoing war, which has left them uncertain about their future. They come from various backgrounds, including different ethnicities, ages, genders, religions, sexualities, education levels, health conditions, and disabilities. It's important to note that men between the ages of 18 and 60 years old in Ukraine are mostly not able to leave the country and are expected to join the army. To learn more about what it means to be a refugee, please check out the 25 questions provided in Danish, and also read about what Ukrainian refugees should know when arriving in Denmark.

As you read and stay informed about the situation in Ukraine, please keep in mind the emotional toll this conflict takes on those affected. You can



follow international news from sources like CNN, BBC, The New York Times, and The Guardian, or Danish news through outlets like The Local (in English), Berlingske Tidende (in Danish), and Politiken (in Danish). Remember to be kind and empathetic towards Ukrainian refugees, who are going through a difficult time and adjusting to a new environment.

What is the Buddy Program?

As a newly established NGO, Aid Ukraine Denmark is proud to offer a Buddy program to support Ukrainians in Denmark. Launched in response to the Russian aggression against Ukraine, our Buddy program is a young initiative that aims to promote integration and social cohesion through connecting Ukrainians with local volunteers.

At Aid Ukraine Denmark, we understand that transitioning to a new country and culture can be overwhelming and challenging. That's why we offer a Buddy program to help ease this process by connecting recently arrived Ukrainians with local volunteers.

Our volunteer Buddies provide Ukrainians with practical guidance, help open doors to local networks, and assist with cultural and linguistic interpretation. Ultimately, the decision on whether to meet in person or virtually should be made collaboratively between you and the Ukrainian participant or family. Communication is key, and it's important to discuss and agree upon a meeting format that works for both parties.

Can I bring someone with me if I meet the Ukrainian(s) in person?

How do I deal with an emotionally or psychologically challenging situation?

Meeting people who are going through difficult times can be a challenging experience, especially when they have experienced significant losses. It can be difficult to know how to help or what to say in these situations, and it is easy to feel overwhelmed and unsure of how to proceed.

However, it is important to remember that you don't have to solve all of their problems. While you may want to do everything you can to help, it is important to recognize that some problems cannot be solved.

In these situations, simply being present and offering a listening ear can make a huge difference. Sometimes, just having someone to talk to and confide in can provide a sense of comfort and support.

It is also important to take care of yourself in these situations. It can be easy to become emotionally drained or overwhelmed, and it is essential to take breaks and practice self-care in order to avoid burnout.

Remember that you don't have to have all the answers in order to make a difference. Simply being there and offering your support and compassion can go a long way in helping someone who is going through a difficult time.

Do I need to inform Borgerservice about the Ukrainian person or family?

At Aid Ukraine Denmark, we understand that navigating the various systems and processes involved in resettlement can be overwhelming, particularly for newcomers. We encourage our Buddies to be proactive in



supporting their Ukrainian participants in this process, and we recognize that this may include assistance with notifying Borgerservice of their arrival.

While it is the responsibility of the Ukrainian participant and their family to inform Borgerservice of their arrival, we understand that language barriers and confusion about the process can make this challenging. As a Buddy, you can help by offering support and guidance on what steps need to be taken, and assisting with any necessary translations.

It's important to note that Borgerservice registration is a crucial step in the resettlement process, as it is required for individuals to access healthcare, education, and other essential services in Denmark. As such, we encourage all Ukrainian participants to register as soon as possible after their arrival.

If you're unsure about the process of Borgerservice registration or have questions about how to assist your Ukrainian participant in this process, don't hesitate to reach out to your Buddy Team under buddy@aidukraine.dk. They can provide you with more information and connect you with additional resources to help navigate this process.

What do I do, if I am asked about migration from Ukraine and settlement in Denmark?

At Aid Ukraine Denmark, we understand that the process of fleeing Ukraine and arriving in Denmark can be complex and difficult for families. It is natural for Ukrainian participants to have questions or concerns about their



situation, and as a Buddy, you may be approached with some of these queries.

For any questions regarding travel from Ukraine please refer to the State Border Guard Service of Ukraine https://dpsu.gov.ua/, Ukrainian Foreign Ministry https://mfa.gov.ua/ or The Embassy of Ukraine in Denmark https://denmark.mfa.gov.ua/.

If a participant comes to you with questions about their family's relocation or about any legal, administrative, or social aspects of their situation, here are some steps you can take to help:

- **1. Listen attentively:** First and foremost, it is important to actively listen to the participant's concerns and questions. Show empathy and let them know that you understand how challenging their situation can be.
- 2. Provide information: If you are able to answer the participant's question or have knowledge of the topic, provide them with accurate and helpful information. However, if you are not certain about the answer, it is better to be honest and let them know that you will find out and get back to them with the correct information.
- 3. Direct them to the appropriate resource: If you are not sure about the answer or do not have the necessary knowledge or resources to provide them with a satisfactory answer, don't hesitate to direct them to the appropriate resource. At Aid Ukraine Denmark, we have a team of professionals and volunteers who can help with different areas, including legal and administrative aspects, social support, and more. Encourage the participant to get in touch with the relevant department or consultant, and provide them with the necessary contact information.
- **4. Follow up:** After directing the participant to the appropriate resource, be sure to follow up with them and check in to see if their concerns were addressed. This can help to build trust and show the participant that you are there to support them.



Overall, it is important to be compassionate and supportive when addressing questions and concerns related to the participant's family's relocation. By providing accurate information and directing the participant to the appropriate resource, you can help to ease their worries and provide them with the support they need during this challenging time.

How can I help provide humanitarian aid and basic necessities?

As a Buddy, supporting the family with humanitarian help, including essentials like clothes and shoes, is an important aspect of your role. We understand that providing aid can be a bit overwhelming, so please do not hesitate to contact Aid Ukraine Denmark at buddy@aidukraine.dk, and we will be able to guide you through the process.

There are also various Facebook groups that offer support to the Ukrainian community in Denmark. One such group is "Information for dansker som huser Ukrainske flytninger!" which offers assistance to those who need clothes, shoes, bedding, and diapers. Their warehouse is located at Saltværksvej 2, 2770 Kastrup and is open from 10 am to 4 pm, Monday to Friday. They require that you bring any identity documents and a preprepared list of needs.

Additionally, the Association of Ukrainians in Denmark and other charitable organizations, including "Bevar Ukraine," "Lastivka," "Hjælp Ukrainske Børn," "Hjælp Ukraine," and "Faino," have opened a warehouse for the distribution of humanitarian aid to Ukrainian migrants. Please feel free to reach out to us or these organizations for assistance in providing aid to the families you are supporting as a Buddy.



How do I help a Ukrainian person get a job?

As the Buddy Program aims to help Ukrainians get into the Danish labor market, there are several strategies that may be effective in achieving this goal. Here are some potential approaches that could be considered:
